Brush gets wrapped up in Japan

Stitches: A Contemporary Interpretation of Classic
Kimono Design
opens at the Brush

Part of the gallery's Building Community Through Culture Exhibition Series, the

show is curated by Lowell fiber artists Cynthia Hughes and Glenn Szegedy and features work by 12 regional artists, sharing their interpretations of classic Japanese kimonos and accouterments, plus Japanese swords and netsuke sculpture. It runs through June 6.

"At first glance, the kimono appears simple in design, but, as with most things Japanese, the simplicity is only on the surface," says Szegedy in press material.

A traditional Japanese tea ceremony will be held on Saturday, May 15, at 2 p.m.
